7:00PM-Chief Dan Ruggles-Awards for First Responders

Chief Ruggles said that the EMT team had a "save" last October. A save is a cardio episode where the patient is not breathing and has no heart rate. The team brought him back to life. The patient is a summer resident who is back to work and doing fine. Hopefully the team will be able to meet him this summer. The team received a pin symbolizing a CPR save.

7:10PM-Boat Launch & Town Dock Public Hearing

Scott Hazelton went over the proposed Boat Launch & Town Dock Ordinance and permit application with the Board. The ordinance was the result of damage happening to the boat launch and complaints regarding commercial users of the boat launch blocking access. The proposed ordinance went through 4 different "drafts" and each time revisions that were requested by the Board as a result of the input from residents and commercial users. The reason the Board wanted to hold this hearing tonight was to allow the summer residents the opportunity to provide input and any additional input from commercial users. Scott Hazelton said last year after going through this whole thing Chief Cahill and Scott Hazelton tracked the people, including commercial users, who were using all 3 of the boat launches which included Burkehaven, Georges Mills and the Harbor. There was some damage last year most of which the town was contacted about and the commercial entities who damaged it agreed to fix it. There was some damage that the town couldn't figure out how it was done, so the town had to fix it. One of the things that this ordinance was set out to do was to get a handle on who was using the boat launches and when as far as commercial users go and to make it easier for both commercial and residential users. One of the things that was requested during this process was if the town were going to have a permit that the commercial users would have an opportunity to have a seasonal permit, which was no problem to Chief Cahill or Scott Hazelton. A lot of the commercial users will call Chief Cahill or Scott Hazelton to tell them a date and time when they might be loading a barge or loading sand and/or gravel, which has worked out well. A condition on the permit could be if someone is given a seasonal permit that they would need to contact one of them. Scott Hazelton that the plan this year is to improve the ramp in the water. He has met with Watermark and Hansen Bridge and hopefully this year, depending on the cost, the existing harbor ramp pads will be replaced by concrete logs, which are like the Fish and Game access launch ramps around the state. Selectman Augustine stated what caught his attention was that the penalties were relatively low. So, for \$25 someone could park their boat in one of the dock spaces that has a 20 minutes limit and walk around the harbor for 2 hours. Scott Hazelton replied that the fees were recommended by the Board. Donna Nashawaty said the fees are only for the spots in the boat launch area. Selectman Augustine said the Board would have to see how it is working and if there happens to be a lot of offenders then the penalties might need to be more severe. Chairman Trow opened the meeting for public comments. Charlene Osborne said just because they live in town, they would have to get a seasonal permit but there were other marinas from all over the state that come to Lake Sunapee to launch. In her opinion, she doesn't feel like any of those marinas are going to go through the permit process to launch in Sunapee. In addition, how are the out of town marinas going to know about this permit process. Donna Nashawaty said that this was off the cuff, but she feels it would be tracked like the way firework permit are tracked. The approved list of seasonal permits would be posted somewhere to be determined on the town website. Selectman Gottling asked if the marinas had an association that could put out a notice regarding the permit for launching in Sunapee. Someone in the audience said there was a Marine Dealers Association, but that's only for dealers, not a marina that winterizes or does repairs. Richard Osborne stated that he knows what Selectman Augustine was saying regarding paying a \$25 penalty fee to rent dock space in the harbor for 4 hours. His question is that's its's a non-fee permit, what is its purpose? Chairman Trow replied that a big part of it was for tracking in case there was damage to the infrastructure that the town would have an idea or knowledge of who might have done it.

Chuck Weinstein also asked what the purpose of this permit was. Is it because people have caused damage to the boat launch? Chairman Trow replied that there has been damage to the Boat launch due to commercial entities and the other part is people in general are not aware of how much damage they can do with their boat. After some discussion, some revisions need to be made to the ordinance, so it will be reviewed at the June 17th meeting

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

•Harry Roher has some concerns about the condition of Lake Avenue. His concerns are with the drainage and the amount salt and sand being used on the road. Scott Hazelton replied that he uses "super sand", which is a 2 to 1 mixture of sand and salt, so the town is not putting down more salt than they need too. The only time the town uses straight salt is in the event of an ice or freezing rainstorm to make the road safe. Historically the town puts down somewhere in the neighborhood of 1,000 to 1,200 tons annually throughout the town's paved roads. This year a little more was used due to more freezing rain events versus not as many last year. The Highway Department was not able to get out and sweep as quickly as they were in years past because the spring extended way into April. The sand was swept to the side of the roads until the Contractor could finish up the sweeping. After this is done the Highway Department will come out and begin ditching, to get ready for the paving program. The catch basins are cleaned out annually and it was just finished last week. Mr. Roher said he was glad Scott Hazelton was aware of the problem.

•Chuck Weinstein wanted to know the procedure for grading dirt roads. Scott Hazelton said now that the frost is out of the ground the Highway Department is going around grading the dirt roads. The dirt roads are typically graded 3 times a year.

Scott Blewitt signed off on the application but on the condition that they are clear of Dewey Beach by 8AM. The Board changed the loading time from 6AM-9AM to 6AM-8AM. In addition the Board changed the number of people from 300 to 20 and number of vehicles from 100 to 5.

•Approve Fire Department Organizational Chart & Job Descriptions

Chairman Trow said that the Town Manager, Fire Chief and the Fire Wards have been getting job descriptions together for Fire Department. They also worked on the Organizational Chart. The Fire Wards have decided to use the town's policies and procedures to make sure everyone gets paid and has a process on hiring and firing. The Fire Wards have already approved the Organizational Chart and job descriptions and are now bringing it to the Board of Selectmen to review, approve and adopt both items. Motion to adopt the proposed Organizational Chart and job descriptions by Selectman Gottling, seconded by Selectman Hastings. 4 in Favor, Chairman Trow Abstained.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

- •Chairman Trow bought up the state boat launch earlier, but it will be interesting to see if it passes though the state.
- •Selectman Augustine said that there were no job postings on the town website, are there any openings? Donna Nashawaty replied the only one she is aware of is the mechanic.

TOWN MANAGER REPORTS

Summer Town Meeting

Donna Nashawaty asked the Board if they wanted to hold the Summer Town Meeting this year. The meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, August 6th. Donna Nashawaty said the Board had a discussion last year regarding speaking to the same audience. Maybe something like pre-recording department heads on what's going on in their departments. Donna Nashawaty stated that last Thursday Chief Cahill invited all the department heads to come to Coffee with the Chief update residents on what projects they were working on. It was a huge success with about 28 to 30 residents who came compared to the 5 residents who came to last year's Summer town meeting. Selectman Gottling wondered why it was such a success. Selectman Augustine feels that the interactive nature of it is appealing to people. There was a topic that got presented, but then everyone in the room could ask a question. Donna Nashawaty would like to try something different and will try to solicit someone who has a camera and knows how to edit to help her.

•Stagecoach Road Closure

Chairman Trow said that the Police and Highway departments both put out email blasts that Stagecoach Road would be closed. Scott Hazelton said the Stagecoach Road portion will be closed for the next 3 weeks. That is from Route 103B to Stagecoach Lane and alternative routes to use are Winn Hill Road, Hells Corner and Youngs Hill.

July BOS Meeting

Donna Nashawaty said she will be on vacation for the July 1st Board of Selectmen's meeting. Does the Board want to still hold the meeting, reschedule or cancel, there is nothing on the agenda. Would the Board like to tentatively reschedule the meeting for July 8th? Chairman Trow said and the Board agreed to cancel the meeting on July 1st and set one for the 8th if needed.

•Monthly Expenditure & Revenue Reports

The Board received the May monthly Expenditure and Revenue reports. Donna Nashawaty say she just received the reports this morning and hasn't had a chance to review, but nothing jumps

out at her.

Meeting Room Policy

Donna Nashawaty made an executive decision over the past week. She was trying to schedule the first Energy Committee meeting and the committee was leaning towards meeting at the Safety Services Building. Donna Nashawaty said that if the Town Office meeting room is available then the meeting should be held here since this is the primary meeting spot. The heat comes on automatically or has instructions to be manually programed. Each committee is given a key to the door and the camera is set-up for the streaming. You can also pull the town calendar up to schedule future meetings and at the Safety Services Building it has to be double checked though both Chiefs to make sure they have nothing scheduled. If the committee meets at the Safety Services Building, you have to get access to the meeting room, the camera would need to be turned on. The camera is shut off because of security training or classes that are conducted by the Police and Fire Departments. And when the meeting is over the Officer on duty must come down and lock the room up. The Board had no issue with the Town Manager's decision.

BOAT LAUNCH & TOWN DOCK ORDINANCE

SECTION 1. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this ordinance shall be to promote harmonious use of the Town boat launches and docking facilities by everyone who visits them. This includes Town residents, tax payers, visitors, commercial users, recreational organizations, and organized tournament users. It is important to the Town of Sunapee that we maintain a positive relationship with everyone that regularly launch from the Town boat launches and/or that utilize the Town docks. It is equally important to create a positive relationship with new users. It is for both purposes that we offer this ordinance.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS. In this ordinance:

- A. Boat Launch means real property abutting the waters of Lake Sunapee and owned and maintained by the Town of Sunapee for the purpose of launching boats.
- B. Boat shall mean any craft or vehicle which is used for travel on water.
- C. Commercial shall mean any enterprise conducted for financial gain or benefit by reason of the sale of goods or services.
- D. Dock shall me any Town-owned structure or other facility used in connection with water access including but not limited to all dock structures, the boat launch ramp and the boat launch loading/unloading areas.
- E. Operator shall mean any person who shall have physical control of a motor vehicle, including but not limited to a boat, boat trailers, barges.
- F. Parking Lot shall mean any facility used for the convenience of motor vehicles (including boats) in such a way as to provide for non-permanent storage, temporary abandonment, stationary visitation or operator access to nearby facilities including the boat launch and docks.
- G. Power Loading is a term used to describe using the motor to load and unload a boat or vessel onto and off a boat trailer at a boat launch.

SECTION 3. HOURS OF CLOSING.

The boat launches and Town docks shall be open between the hours of a half hour before sunrise and one half hour after sunset, except as provided below:

- A. Any commercial business may apply for a Boat Launch & Dock Use Permit from the Board of Selectmen to use of the boat launches, Town docks and adjacent parking areas during closed times. Said permit may be issued by Board of Selectmen or its designee when it is in the public interest to do so.
- B. Residents, tax payers or visitors may use the boat launches and/or Town docks at any time of the day or night for pleasure boating purposes only provided that said activities are not in conflict with other Town ordinances.

SECTION 4. ACTS REQUIRING A BOAT LAUNCH & DOCK USE PERMIT.

No permit is required for residents, tax payers, or visitors to launch or haul out pleasure boats at the Town's boat launches.

- A. Commercial barge operators and licensed septic pumping companies seeking to use the boat launches, Town docks, or adjacent parking areas shall obtain a Boat Launch & Dock Use Permit from the Board of Selectmen or its' designee.
- B. Commercial marinas seeking to use the boat launches, Town dock, or adjacent parking areas for the purposes of launching and/or hauling out pleasure boats shall provide the Town with a copy of their insurance certificate with the Town named as additionally insured.
- C. Boat Launch & Dock Use Permit applications are available at the Town Office and shall include a description of the proposed use, the inclusive dates and times of use, the anticipated impacts on residents, visitors, and other users, a statement that the commercial operator shall be responsible for any damage that they or their subcontractors do to the facility, and shall include a copy of the commercial operator's insurance certificate with the Town named as additionally insured.
- D. The Board of Selectman or its designee may issue a one-time Boat Launch & Dock Use Permit, or a seasonal Boat Launch & Dock Use Permit, after they have reviewed the application and when they feel that circumstances warrant a specific permit type.
- E. The Board of Selectmen retain the option to require commercial operators to post a bond for their proposed use.
- F. A Boat Launch & Dock Use Permit must be in the commercial operator's possession before using the boat launches, docks or adjacent parking lots.
- G. No commercial operator shall preclude others from using the boat launches for a prolonged period of time, and they shall not exceed the time limit proposed to and accepted by the Board of Selectmen on the Boat Launch & Dock Use Permit.

SECTION 5. ACTS PROHIBITED

- A. No motor vehicles, wheeled or tracked construction equipment, construction materials or supplies, skateboards, bicycles, scooters, roller blades or the like shall be permitted on Town docks.
- B. Power loading of boats onto boat trailers at Town boat launch ramps is strongly discouraged. Damage that is caused to Town boat launch ramps or associated components thereof, as a result of power loading by any person(s), and that is observed by any Town official or employee, shall be repaired by the person(s) causing the damage at no expense to the Town.
- C. No boats shall be docked in the areas that are reserved for the MV Mount Sunapee or MV Kearsarge boats.
- D. No boats shall dock in the slip closest to any public launching ramp except that docking for a period not to exceed 20 minutes shall be allowed for purposes of loading and unloading only.
- E. No overnight docking shall be permitted.
- F. No swimming or playing in the water of Sunapee Harbor including the boat launch is permitted.

SECTION 6. PENALTIES

A. Violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute a violation, and anyone so convicted may be required to pay a fine of twenty five dollars (\$25) for the first offense, one hundred dollars (\$100) for a second offense and two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for the third offense. Future or repeated violations of any provision of this ordinance may result with additional fines and/or being denied use of the boat launches and Town docks. All appeals shall be to the Board of Selectmen.

SECTION 7. ENFORCEMENT.

This ordinance shall be enforced by the Board of Selectmen, its designees, and by the Town of Sunapee Police Department or any other police agency having jurisdiction within the Town of Sunapee in the manner prescribed for enforcement of violations of law by New Hampshire Statute.

SECTION 8. EXCEPTIONS

The Police Department, Fire Department and Highway Department shall be exempt from this ordinance for the purpose of conducting routine Town business and/or for responding to emergencies.

In the event of an emergency that involves and/or requires the use of the boat launches or Town docks, residents, tax payers, visitors, operators and/or commercial users may be granted a verbal exception from this ordinance by the Board of Selectmen, Town of Sunapee Police Department, Town of Sunapee Fire Department, or the Town of Sunapee Highway Department.

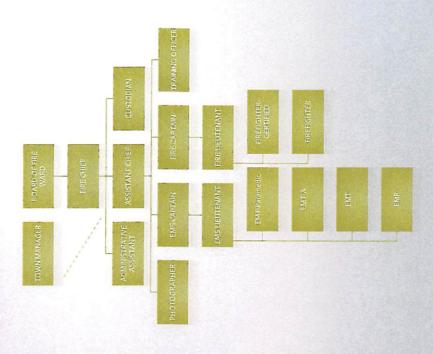

- Graduation from high school or GED equivalent with specialized training EMS administration.

PHYSICAL DEMANDS

The physical demands described here are representative of those that must be met by an employee to successfully perform the essential functions of this job.

While performing the duties of this job, the employee is frequently required to stand; walk; sit; use hands to finger, handle, feel or grasp; reach, grasp and torque with hands and arms; to speak, see, hear and smell. Employee must regularly lift, move and carry in excess of 100 pounds, frequently reach above and below shoulder height, and frequently required to push and /or pull. Other physical demands include frequently twisting, bending, crawling, squatting, kneeling, crouching, climbing and balancing.

WORK ENVIRONMENT

Work is performed primarily in vehicles, and outdoor settings, in all weather conditions, including temperature extremes, during day and night calls. Work is often performed in emergency and stressful situations. Individual is exposed to hearing alarms and hazards associated with fighting fires and rendering emergency medical assistance, including smoke, noxious odors, fumes, chemicals, liquid chemicals, solvents and oils.

The employee occasionally works near moving mechanical parts and in high, precarious places and is occasionally exposed to wet and/or humid conditions, fumes or airborne particles, toxic or caustic chemicals, risk of electrical shock, and vibration.

The noise level in the work environment is usually loud at an emergency scene.

WORK SCHEDULE

This is an on-call position so work schedule will vary as needed.
